Nehemiah with a burdened heart and unmixed motives had undertaken the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem, which had lain untouched for 140 years. It was a gigantic task fraught with many difficulties from within and without.

Not least among his problems was the opposition of Tobiah and his followers. Tobiah, we are told, was not a Jew but an Ammonite:

however, contrary to the divine decree, he had married a woman who was a Jew and his son had married a Jewess. Gathered together under the leadership of Tobiah, these compromised Jews, their friends, and relatives became one of the greatest hindrances to the advancement of the work of God. Apparently they allowed family ties and personal friendships to override their moral sense and spiritual duty. They did the wrong thing, and they did it in the wrong spirit. Their weapons were cruel ridicule, vicious threats, slander, conspiracy, and active opposition. Theirs was not simply the difference of viewpoint which frequently occurs among brethren and which is tempered by charity and brotherly kindness and thus preserves priceless Christian fellowship. No, this was corroding carnality, bitter, vindictive, rejoicing in the suffering, humiliation, and defeat of those whom they opposed. They were "very wroth" at any report of progress or advancement in the work of rebuilding the walls.

What a sad, depressing picture! The work of God was carried forward in spite of this sad condition, but it was damaged and hindered. God will carry on His work and build His Church, but this story should serve as a warning to all of us. Our love to God must always be supreme in our lives. Human relationships with relatives or friends must not deter us from doing right in the fear of God. The Bible does exhort us to use much prayer and wisdom in the handling of delicate problems growing out of our human relationships but never to the extent that we become members of the company of the compromised.

If we keep filled with the Spirit, we will not fulfill the lusts of the flesh. Compromise is ruinous when expressed either in deeds or in spirit quality. We must prayerfully watch both what we do and the spirit in which we do it.

But it came to pass, that when Sanballat, and Tobiah, and the Arabians, and the Ammonites, and the Ashdodites, heard that the walls of Jerusalem were made up, and that the breaches began to be stopped, then they were very wroth, and conspired all of them together to come and to fight against Jerusalem, and to hinder it (Neh. 4:7-8). So the wall was finished in the twenty and fifth day of the month of Elul, in fifty and two days (Neh. 6:15).

Beware of Salan's . . .

Boll Weevil!

Recently while returning from a revival in Louisiana, we were stopped atop a bridge connecting the state lines. A government inspector asked if we had any cotton aboard. He said that they were trying to prevent the boll weevil from crossing into Missispipi. I thought about that statement for quite a while, then turned to my husband and said, "That's just like sin." This boll weevil is only about one-fourth inch long and its life span is only about three weeks, but throughout the season it punctures the cotton buds and bolls and lass eggs in them.

Sometimes sin comes in a small and insignificant form (or at least so we think) but it isn't long until the vitality of the whole being is sapped. It doesn't take long for this "little sin" to gnaw its way into the very internal tissues of our souls.

This boll weevil insect was first known in Central America and the West Indies. But little by little it has spread into Mexico and on into our own cottongrowing regions at the rate of about

We like to think of ourselves as sheep, with Christ as our Shepherd, and this is Biblical. But do we follow this allusion clear through? The shepherd leads; the sheep follow. We as Christians sax, "Yes, I am following; therefore I am His sheep." We like to think of the sheep as being dependent upon the shepherd, looking to him for sustenance and protection, just as we do as Christians.

But there is another side to the picture also. The shepherd does not keep sheep simply for pastime. He expects that his flock should grow. Any sheep that fails to bring an increase into the flock at the appointed season is taken out and sent to the market. Is it too much for our Shepherd to expect an increase of the flock because of our in dividual efforts?

And too, what about shearing time? We like to be led into the green pastures and beside the still waters, but too often we rebel when shearing time comes. Perhaps it's a habit that needs shearing away, perhaps an idea, perhaps a personal quirk, or oddity-something that is keeping us from doing our best. We squirm and fidget under the shears. There is usually some pain and discomfort connected with shearing, and we struggle with the Shepherd. But remember, it's the struggling sheep that gets "nicked" the deepest. The one that submits willingly and patiently to the shearing will fare better than the one that struggles and attempts to escape.

"... we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand" (Ps. 95:7). Are we sheep all the way? Not only as we follow along the pleasant paths, but also when we are led into the shearing pen?

"And when he putteth forth his own sheep, he goeth before them, and the sheep follow him; for they know his voice" (John 10:4).

seventy miles a year. Also this deadly insect of sin, although small in the beginning, continues to spread until all spiritual life is damaged.

Occasionally we find that it spreads in the church and thereby damages the plant life of people, just as the weevil does to the cotton bolls. The damaged bolls remain upon the plant but they become stunted or dwarfed.

If we who follow after Christ do not watch the "little things" in our lives. we too may become stunted and dwarfed in our souls. The devil doesn't care how much we go to church or take part in the program of the church as long as we are puny, weak-kneed Christians. But the need of today is not for dwarfs but for spiritual giants, strong and bold to cry out against sin and wickedness. Let's give ourselves a good "crop dussing" until the last bit of sin is destroyed and we can be live, growing, and productive Christians. A thirty-hour bus ride and a tactful winner of souls thrilled me with . . .

GREYHOUND EVANGELISM

One of my frequent embarrassing moments, the result of a vagrant memory, was the prelude to one of the most memorable experiences of my visits to America.

"Dr. Frame of Scotland," was the startling greeting extended to me by a passenger who joined our Greyhound bus as we traveled through Kentucky on our way to Florida.

"Do you remember the last time we met? You took me for dinner to the Fitzpatricks in Lurgan and to the Jamiesons in Belfast for supper."

The names of two of my friends in Ireland gave me a clue. He turned out to be Ephraim . . . one of the fine GI's who visited our homes and churches during the war years.

Our conversation quickly revealed that he was unique among my American acquaintances. He had never been to college. He did not possess an automobile. On his farm he had neither electricity nor a tractor. He was still a bachelor at forty.

This unknown Nazarene soon demonstrated, however, that he was one of the most remarkable characters that I have met. He unwittingly made the Greyhound bus the most important classroom in which I have ever sat. He transformed a tedious thirty-hour bus ride into a series of thrill-packed sessions on personal evangelism.

His first companion in the seat immediately in front of us was a middle-aged lady. He opened up conversation with her and in a short time we were listening to another domestic tragedy. Forsaken for another woman, she was on her way to the city to seek employment. Her bitterness poured out in alternating outbursts of despair and cynicism.

With consummate case he began to witness to her about what Christ had done in his life and he made her hopelessness an opportunity to tell her about the wonderful grace of God.

Her seat was occupied in the next city by a native of Georgia who loudly declared that once he left it this time he never wanted to see it again. Ephraim's question, "Why?" gave him the opportunity to inform the whole bus that he now owned



a tavern in Florida. I was not disappointed in thinking that the next few hours would be interesting.

Tavern strategy tried to counter Ephraim's glowing testimony with a barrage of professed churchgoing, morality, and charity and quite logically he ended up with a vigorous defense of the drink traffic. Then our veteran swung into his counterattack and, through a skillful use of the Bible and the lessons of the experience of himself and his buddies, he soon demolished all these specious arguments. He then pressed the claims of Christ and all was done with amazing wisdom and kindness.

I have never been able to solve the mystery. At a bus depot twelve hours away from our tavern friend's declared destination he failed to rejoin the bus.

Jacksonville brought Ephraim his next companion. She was a young lady who had made lavish use of all the resources of fashion and beauty culture. What point of contact could our sober-minded veteran make with this human butterfly?

He entered into a pleasant conversation with her about vacations. She was looking forward with keen delight to cocktail parties and dances; he, with equal anticipation, to the Nazarene services in Miami. Startled though she was by the contrast, she was nevertheless deeply moved as he told her of the abounding joy that Christ had brought into his life.

It seemed to me that we reached Miami far too quickly, for it brought to a premature end a glorious adventure in soul winning. That Greyhound bus had staged for me the greatest convention in

evangelism that I have ever attended. Passion instead of platitudes, practice in place of theory challenged and condemned me. If no soul was converted during that journey one soul was inspired to new evangelistic effort.

Carry on, Ephraim, your effective and contagious witness until every Nazarene has caught your vision, shared your passion, and been inspired to join you in your soul winning and you will have shown us the way to revival.

THROUGH THE PREACHING OF SCRIPTURAL HOLINESS

Something wonderful happened in my home church, Yakima (Wash.) First, last Sunday (February 10)! The Holy Spirit moved in upon the services through the ministry of my pastor, Rev. J. Paul Downey, and sixty-two people were saved or sanctified. The theme of the preaching? Scriptural holiness!

Unfortunately for me, I was not present because of my responsibilities elsewhere on the district; but, more important, my family was there. My children may speak with firsthand knowledge of the outpouring of the Holy Ghost in mighty, mass sweeping power, as well as an understanding of the doctrine of scriptural holiness. Personal experience stamps this noble doctrine as a reality from God. The children of our church will not have to be content with hearing of the mighty work of God in the past, but they have seen it and felt it in their own generation!

In some quarters, it is well known, we are accused of no longer preaching holiness because we refuse to preach fads and "for doctrines the commandments of men" (Mark 7:7). Unthoughtful people have always been present, since the first days of the Christian Church, to make outward conformity to prescribed ideas of what sanctified people ought or ought not to do as evidence of holiness. On the other hand, we have always had people who oppose

the preaching of scriptural holiness, as one recently complained of the pastor, "All he knows how to preach is holiness, holiness!" Carnally-minded people have always opposed it, because it goes deep to destroy the carnal mind.

While there are many worthy and noble themes in the gospel, the central purpose of redemption, provided by the death of the Saviour, is to make men fit to live with God forever. The only requirement He has made is holiness: "According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love" (Eph. 1:4).

Let there be no mistake, we are a holiness church! Our emphasis from the start was, and still remains, scriptural holiness—with the emphasis on the *scriptural*. We reject fads and freak attachments because our calling is to preach scriptural holiness as a second work of God's redemptive grace, wrought by the cleansing baptism with the Holy Spirit, and that the true signs of this wonderful work of grace are the solution of the personal sin problem and the establishment of perfect love as the new motivation of life. Furthermore, it is our stated and unequivocal purpose to carry this same truth, without variance, into the second fifty years of our church's life.

John Wesley said: "Where Christian perfection is not strongly preached, there is seldom any remarkable blessing from God. Do not forget strongly and explicitly to urge the believers to go on to Christian perfection. When this is constantly and earnestly done, the word is always clothed with power" (Wesley's Journal).

My pastor has been true to his calling; he has preached it plainly, persistently, and scripturally, without fads or freak attachments, and the result was a mighty outpouring of the Spirit of God last Sunday morning with scores being saved and sanctified.

Christian Steadfastness

Stand fast in the Lord (Phil. 4:1).

To "stand fast" means to remain firm, unmoved; to hold one's ground no matter how fierce and prolonged might be the assaults of the enemy. In the old Greek training grounds the first words of the trainer used to be, "Stand firm." It is comparatively easy to drive back an enemy in the first rush, but the crucial test comes when he attacks again and again with renewed vigor.

This exhortation of Paul to the believers in Philippi to "stand fast in the Lord" implies that they were beset by certain foes and that it was necessary for them to be watchful; ready, resolute, courageous, to hold their ground however long and bitter the conflict. Nothing gave the Apostle greater joy than to see his beloved converts remaining steadfast and true when their faith was assailed by adversaries who used every means possible to destroy their faith and hope in Christ.

Writing to believers in Golossae, who had proved themselves to be good soldiers of Jesus Christ, he told them the joy it gave him as, from afar, he beheld their courage, their powers of endurance, their refusal to give an inch of ground to the enemy: "I am absent from you in body, yet in spirit I am present with you, and am delighted to witness your good discipline, and the solid front presented by your faith in Christ" (Col. 2:5, Weymouth).

In the pagan city of Philippi believers would often be persecuted because of their faith. Paul himself had been shamefully and cruelly treated by its citizens. His converts would be threatened, ostracized, and many would suffer material loss. Possibly he had these pagan persecutors in mind when he exhorted believers not to be "terrified" by their "adversaries" (Phil. 1:28). Then there were the Judaizers, "the concision," who were "evil workers" (3:2). They disturbed the faith of some by insisting they must submit to Jewish rites and ordinances if they would be saved.

But perhaps the greatest danger threatening these Christians, who once had been addicted to gross pagan vices, was the presence in Philippi of certain false teachers who taught that, since the soul of the believer is saved by faith, their personal conduct was of little concern. So long as the immortal spirit sought after God it mattered not

how they used their mortal bodies. By their distortion of the truth and their licentious conduct these false teachers dishonored the Cross in the eyes of unbelievers.

With hot tears streaming down his cheeks the Apostle warns his converts against these "enemies of the cross of Christ: whose end is destruction" (Phil. 3:18-19). Knowing the trials and dangers which beset them, the Apostle exhorts believers to be steadfast and true. He knows not whether he will be liberated and able to pay them a visit. Whether so or not, he longs to learn that they are standing "fast in one spirit, with one mind, striving together for the faith of the gospel" (1:27).

We need especially to give heed to this apostolic injunction: "Stand fast in the Lord," in our own day. We are living in a time of great stress and strain. Two world wars and much talk of a third and more terrible war have had a tragic effect on the moral and spiritual life of many. During long years of tension they gradually become slack in their devotional exercises. They ceased to pray, to read the Word, to attend the sanctuary, to associate with fellow believers, and thus became an easy prey to Satan. When assailed by trial and temptation they failed to "stand fast in the Lord," and today they are found in the ranks of the enemy.

I think of one man who is typical of so many. He was a faithful member of his church, engaged in public prayer, conducted family worship in his own home, and was a faithful witness for Christ in a godless factory. Then came the war and he had to work practically every Sunday throughout the war years. Slowly but surely he drifted from Christ. He lost his hold of spiritual things. Wearied, exhausted after long hours in the factory, he was too tired to pray, to read his Bible, and the end of the war found him bereft of any spiritual desire. Who can estimate the number of professing Christians that have failed to stand their ground, when tried and tested, because they neglected every means of grace, without which we must fail!

There seems little doubt that it is going to become increasingly difficult to "stand fast in the Lord" in the future. A faithful servant of Christ told me how difficult it was for her to witness for Christ in an office where she was the sole Christian, and where it was hard to rise above the worldly

atmosphere which surrounded her. The Sabbath is fast losing its sanctity, and the attraction of the radio and television tends to have a harmful effect upon many believers. Many influences are at work which are turning Sunday into just another day.

There will be much to distress and discourage us in the coming days. We shall need a strong faith, a great courage, and much patience if we are to remain "stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord" (I Cor. 15:58). Because times will be hard and difficult we shall often be tempted to take the line of least resistance, to give ground. But for the sake of our immortal souls, for the sake of Christ's kingdom of love, truth, and righteousness, for the sake of those who look to us for an example, we must "stand fast in the Lord." Against every assault of Satan to move us from the "hope of the gospel" (Col. 1:23) we must stand firm as a rock, even as soldiers who hold a vital position will suffer death rather than surrender or retreat.

The whole secret of steadfastness lies in our continuous union with Christ. Through faith we have entered into a spiritual union with Him. We are now in Him as really and vitally as the branch is in the vine. In Him is fullness of life and power, and to dwell in Him is to have His life, His strength and power constantly flowing into our lives. To live in Him and He in us is to be strong and equal to every emergency. To abide in Him is to be victorious, to have His infinite resources at our disposal: not to abide in Him is to live a defeated life, for our Lord says, "Without me ye can do nothing" (John 15:5).

It is by constant communion with our risen Lord through prayer, meditation on His Word, fellowship with Him in service, that we become so rooted and grounded and established in Him that nothing will move us in the day when faith is severely tested. As the roots of our lives strike deeper and deeper into Christ through continuous fellowship with Him, so shall we "stand fast in the Lord" (Phil. 4:1). The secret of strength and victory depends on our looking to Christ, and to Christ alone, for all the grace and strength we need in our conflicts with Satan. "Be ye strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might" (Eph. 6:10).

There are very few home mission churches which can fully support a pastor at the beginning. Only a few young pastors start their ministry in a church with adequate remuneration and they must supplement their salary by working. This sometimes continues for months and with some, even years.

Various methods, too numerous to mention, are used by these pastors to make a living for their families while they preach the gospel. All methods used are honest and honorable but sometimes, especially in small towns and communities, the work the pastor must do on the side lowers his dignity as a pastor, in his own feelings if not in the eyes of others.

A pastor in a town of four thousand population recently gave up his church because, and I quote: "Most of the people in the town know me and I think like me but I am looked upon as a carpenter and painter instead of a preacher or pastor." Honorable work, but he felt it, and it hindered him, even if he was mistaken in the attitude of others.

The support of the pastor in a small church is the problem of every district superintendent. What can we do about it? No young minister can be at his best if he feels that the work he must do for a living is hindering him in the eyes of others.

I have a small church in a good town of five thousand population where I have had a number of college or seminary graduates during the past fifteen years. Each pastor has had to work at something to supplement his salary. Each has felt that the type of work he had to do has hindered him, the progress of the church has been slow, and each man has become discouraged and quit.

Some months ago I urged the present pastor, a Seminary graduate, to try for a teaching job. He was hesitant, fearing he could not get one. I reminded him of a recent report of a shortage of over 200,000 public school teachers in America. He made his application and was successful. This has largely solved the problem of the church. The people are encouraged, this pastor has gained a new self-confidence which has greatly helped him in the town and in the church; the work is growing and is in the Fest condition it ever has been.

The public school teacher is, in most instances, a highly respected leader in the community and teaching, as a vocation, carries with it a dignity found in few others. If a pastor must supplement his salary, he can find no better way than this.

I have at the present time eighteen young pas-

tors, all college and Seminary graduates, who must work on the side to sustain their families. I have talked with most of them personally about this. Each feels that it would solve his temporary problem, but he did not take enough in the field of education to secure a certificate. Each young preacher I have talked with has told me that if he had known about it he could easily have taken enough in the field of education to be able to teach and still be as far along as he is now. Therefore I would urge every preacher who has not finished college to look into this matter. It will be of untold value to you if, as most preachers do, you must begin in a small church on an inadequate salary. As a district superintendent who is constantly meeting these problems, I would urge you to go to your college president, your registrar, your faculty advisers and discuss these matters with them.

I would also appeal to those in our colleges who have the privilege of helping our young ministers to arrange their courses to take this into consideration. Such a procedure would help hundreds of young preachers to cope with the problem of poor pay, be a boon to home mission work, and help every district in solving the financial or salary problem of the small church.

I will simply call him Gust, lest I betray a confidence by revealing his real name.

I was practicing with our organist in the auditorium when I heard the faint click of the outer door of the church and suddenly I remembered I had forgotten to remove the night lock. Dropping everything I was doing, I hastened to open the door and found a man slowly making his way down the front steps. I invited him in and he eagerly accepted the invitation.

When we were in the office and the door closed behind me, this man Gust asked me if there was any forgiveness for a man who had committed the sin of blasphemy. He told me he was a member of a neighbor church and that they considered he was losing his mind. But the real truth was that he was having a nervous breakdown and it was because he suddenly realized he was an awful sinner. As he meditated upon the matter he had decided he was such a sinner because about fifteen years before in a business failure he had blamed God, and cursed and swore at God.

I was able to refer him to Matt. 12:31-32 and to show him that all manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven unto men except the sin which is against the Holy Ghost. His face lighted up with a wonderful smile at the words of scripture and after a few words of prayer and exhortation he left with a measure of peace.

Two days later (December 20, 1956) my friend Gust called me up and asked if he might have another conference with me and I invited him to come and see me. It was a very busy day with Christmas baskets, programs, and a variety of things to do, so that I somewhat regretted having given him the time, and yet I felt it was important. As he came in this time he told me that his blasphemy was all under the Blood but that in the light of what he had now seen he could declare that he was the world's worst sinner and he doubted he had ever been really converted and desired me to show him clearly the way of salvation.

As one would lead a child, I took him through the message of salvation. I had him read Isa. 53:5 There are over twenty-five hundred towns and cities in the United States where there is no Church of the Nazarene. There is much yet to be done—the Easter Offering will help us to do it.

An SOS Is Sent Out

A car was struck by another car, which was speeding; the driver of the latter was trying to get away from a policeman. The only occupant of the first car, a husband, and the father of six children, was killed. There was nothing to indicate that he was in any way to blame for the accident.

Kansas City was stirred. The wife and mother was visited and asked what she was going to do. She said that she planned to do her best to keep the family together, though they had been depending solely upon the father's wages. Then the daily paper and others began to send out an SOS for help. People are rallying to this call. The hope is that \$25,000 will be raised and the family and home saved.

As has already been indicated, many have been stirred because of the plight this mother and her children were left in by this reckless driver. It is natural for them to be aroused and want to do something in behalf of this home where tragedy has struck.

Nevertheless, if we as members and friends of the Church of the Nazarene could, by virtue of some unusual means, be taken to our mission fields and given a firsthand acquaintance with the needs there, we would be even more aroused than the citizens of Kansas City are about the condition of this home. There are millions of people today in other lands where material needs are met only in a very meager way. Beyond this, there are spiritual conditions which are even more tragic.

Just recently I read a letter from a missionary. She speaks of lands and countries where they have none of the modern conveniences which we have. They would think of us, with all our blessings and conveniences, as being millionaires. Here is one illustration, for instance. Sometimes we run across those in this country who rail on women for wearing tocless shoes. In commenting on this fact, this missionary said, "I immediately thought of one-half the world's population who have never owned a pair of shoes of any kind. How happy they would be if someone would give them an inexpensive pair of tocless sandals like those worn by our precious Lord! They would consider themselves very rich indeed if this should happen to them."

It is difficult for those of us who have not been in these lands to imagine the limitations under which many of the inhabitants of the earth live today. And it is even more difficult for us to realize their spiritual need, the darkness of sin which enshrouds them, the hopelessness, in this respect, which many of them face. If we could really take that trip around the world and see these conditions as they are, we wouldn't have any difficulty about raising the largest Easter Offering that we have ever had. Out of our abundance we should give our dollars more readily than the people of Kansas City are giving to help this family which has been left without a breadwinner.

Have you informed yourself about the prayer needs of our mission fields, the new fields which we should enter, the calls for more missionaries in the fields now open, the new buildings and facilities we must have if we would accomplish our task as we should? If you are not acquainted with these facts, do your best to find out about them, and then in the presence of God decide how much—not how little—you can give to the Easter missionary offering.



Thank God for a church which believes in missions! Let us, as members and friends of the Church of the Nazarene, arise and meet the challenge which its leaders have set before us.

Little Talks on the Holy Spirit:

13. The Holy Spirit and the Death and Resurrection of Jesus

There is a very significant passage on this subject in Hebrews: "How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?" (9:14) Notice, it says, "Who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God." The writer is undoubtedly referring here to the death of Jesus, because the verse begins with these words, "How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, . . . ?" It was by the help of the Spirit that He gave himself on the Cross, that He shed His blood there for you and me. This made it possible for God to purge our consciences "from dead works," so that we could serve the living God.

Salvation hinges finally and supremely upon Jesus' death on the Cross.

The Blood, the Blood, is all my plea. Hallelujah, for it cleanseth me! Oh, the Blood, the Blood, is all my plea: Hallelujah, for it cleanseth me!

We are living in an age when the Blood is being discounted by some who call themselves followers of Christ: they are ready to ignore the death of Christ. They will accept His life, teachings, and example: they will talk about the Incarnation, but they have little to say about "The Old Rugged Cross." But it must be remembered that the Cross

is just as essential today as it ever was. "Without shedding of blood is no remission" of sins. One might say that everything in the Old Testament moves in that direction, and everything in the New Testament centers upon it. It was not so much what Jesus said or did when He walked among men upon this earth; it was what He did on the Cross that counts. Again, it was the eternal Spirit who enabled Him to offer himself without spot to God.

Jesus' climactic miracle was His resurrection; it was the capstone of all His work. His blood saves and cleanses, but His blood would have been of no avail if He had not broken asunder the bonds

of death and come forth from the grave. We can't stop short of the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ. All of the Gospels close with the wonderful story of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. John puts it in these words:

"The first day of the week cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre, and seeth the stone taken away from the sepulchre. Then she runneth, and cometh to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and saith unto them, They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid him. . . . But Mary stood without at the sepulchre weeping: and as she wept, she stooped down, and looked into the sepulchre, and seeth two angels in white sitting, the one at the head, and the other at the feet, where the body of Jesus had lain. And they say unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? She saith unto them, Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid him. And when she had thus said, she turned herself back, and saw Jesus standing, and knew not that it was Jesus. Jesus saith unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? whom seekest thou? She, supposing him to be the gardener, saith unto him, Sir, if thou have borne him hence, tell me where thou hast laid him, and I will take him away. Jesus saith unto her, Mary. She turned herself, and saith unto him, Rabboni; which is to say, Master. Jesus saith unto her, Touch me not; for I am not yet ascended to my Father: but go to my brethren, and say unto them, I ascend unto my Father, and your Father; and to my God, and your God. Mary Magdalene came and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken these things unto her" (20:1-18).

No more exciting words ever were penned than these. No wonder the Christian Church has been worshiping ever since on the first day of the week. It is no surprise that it has thus made out of every Sunday an Easter Day, an Easter celebration.

My main emphasis here is that the Holy Ghost had a part in this Resurrection. We read in Romans, "But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you" (8:11). Notice that the first part of this verse emphasizes the fact that it was the Spirit of God which raised up Jesus from the dead. He had a part in the atonement, the death of Jesus on the Cross, and in Jesus' triumphant resurrection. Upon these two events, more than upon anything else, hangs the salvation of this world, the salvation of every man. Without either His death or His resurrection there would be no hope for you and me. Remember, the Holy Ghost was there. He was busy during the dispensation of the Son as well as during the dispensation of the Father.

What We Believe:

6. Atonement

"We believe that Jesus Christ, by His sufferings, by the shedding of His own blood, and by His meritorious death on the Cross, made a full atonement for all human sin, and that this atonement is the only ground of salvation, and that it is sufficient for every individual of Adam's race. The atonement is graciously efficacious for the salvation of the irresponsible and for the children in innocency, but is efficacious for the salvation of those who reach the age of responsibility only when they repent and believe."

The atonement was wrought by the death of Jesus Christ on the Cross. His shed blood is the only ground of man's salvation. The atonement of Jesus is universal; that is, His death made it possible for all men to find their way back to God. He didn't die just for certain people; He died for all people. Those who are irresponsible and the children who die in innocency receive the benefits of Christ's atonement, unconditionally. On the other hand, those who reach the age of responsibility can partake of the benefits of Jesus' atonement only when they repent and believe. To this last group the benefits of the atonement are conditional.

Here are some of the scriptures which present the truth of the atonement: In Heb. 9:22 we are told that "without shedding of blood is no remission" of sins. In John we read, "I am the good shepherd, and know my sheep, . . . As the Father knoweth me, even so know I the Father: and I lay down my life for the sheep" (John 10:14-15). In Mark we have these words, "For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many" (10:45). In Matthew we read: "And as they were cating. Jesus took bread, and blessed it, and brake

it, and gave it to the disciples, and said, Take, eat; this is my body. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins" (26:26-28).

There is nothing more evident in the New Testament than the truth that the shedding of Jesus' blood made men's salvation possible. He who discounts the blood of Jesus is trampling underfoot that which alone makes it possible for him to enter heaven.



The Significance of Suffering

SCRIPTURE: Matt. 26:1-27:10 (Printed Matt. 26:26-29: 36-46)

Golden Text: O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me: new-ertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt (Matt. 26:39).

We begin this second quarter's study with three more lessons from Matthew concerning the life of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our scripture lesson for this Sunday's study deals with two great events in Christ's life: first, the keeping of the Passover by the Lord with His disciples, and second, the trying hours of the Gethsemane experience.

With the keeping of the Passover by Christ we have also the institution of the sacrament of the new dispensation -the Communion or the Lord's Supper. There are a number of great lessons in the teaching of Christ concerning this supper. There is the privilege of communion or fellowship with Christ by every believer. The partaking of the Communion also means the actual partaking of Christ, by faith. When proper preparation of spirit is made for this partaking, and it is observed with reverence and holy fellowship, this service or sacrament is of great spiritual benefit to the believing soul. Tied in with the communion service is the lesson concerning Christ's second coming. We may gladly look forward to the time when we may have our Lord drink with us the true wine of the eternal Kingdom in our Father's land.

The Gethsemane experience of our Lord is beyond the comprehension of finite minds. The suffering of our Lord here is beyond that known by mortal man. Truly He went a little farther. Yes, farther than any other has gone or ever will go, and He did it for you and for me! He was truly the "man of sorrows."

Christ was a lonely Man, while here on this earth. In so many of His great hours of trial He was forsaken and alone—yet not alone, for the angels ministered to Him, and the Father always heard Him.

The humanity of our Lord Jesus is very manifest in this great hour of trial. He was the Son of Man. Yet He did not fail but triumphed in the words of our Golden Text, "Nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt."

We see the weakness of the disciples in their falling asleep in the great hour of crisis, when their Lord needed companionship and they needed prayer for the trying hours ahead of them. However we need not be too quick to censure them, lest we be found guilty likewise. How many times have we been asleep when we should have been praying; Indeed, the spirit is willing but the flesh is weak.

Manana Preached This Morning ELIZABETH COLE, Africa

Manana preached this morning. He exhorted the patients and staff in the Mbuluzi Leprosy Hospital to go forward, looking unto Jesus, "who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross." Manana's voice trembled just a little as he spoke of the Cross and the sufferings endured there. He understood the meaning of suffering. He had tasted its bitter cup again and again. Had not his beloved mother and five of his brothers and sisters died one after the other with leprosy? Had not he himself suffered and despaired even of life with this same sickness?

When Manana was admitted to this colony in 1948 his face and body were covered with reddish welts, some of which were open wounds. His eyebrows, evelashes, one eve, and parts of his nose, hands, and feet were gone. Humanly speaking, death would have seemed a sweet release. Today this same young man stood before us preaching. Healed and happy, he is a trusted member of our staff, ready to serve in the garden, hospital, church, or wherever he is needed. He stood there a precious African soul who was washed in the blood of the Lamb, a living testimony that leprosy can be conquered. This is just one example of what prayer and faith and medical science are doing to relieve those who have contracted this sickness in Swaziland and in other parts of the world.

The good people who are so faithful in prayer for us will be encouraged to know that many of our patients are being discharged from this colony symptom-free each year. Two years ago two of these patients dismissed as cured were former witch doctors who had given us considerable competition when the work started here.

While we rejoice with the patients who have been healed and who have found victory in Jesus, let us not forget those who have never received spiritual care and the modern treatment for leprosy. In many instances there is

still "no room" for these people and at times they are still badly treated, being dependent on food thrown to them as if they were animals. In other instances they are left out or forgotten completely. As we remember in prayer those forgotten ones, may we see the need for the expansion of leprosy work until all those who suffer this disease may have spiritual and medical help. It may be that God's guiding hand will show us new spheres of service, new opportunities for victory, and new territories to conquer for His kingdom. If that be so let us go in and "possess the land." It is even possible that some may overhear the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" To this let us answer gladly —"Here am I; send me."

New Churches

District Superintendent Orville Jenkins organized the River Oaks Church in Fort Worth, Texas, on January 23 with thirty-four charter members. Rev. Charles B. McCall was appointed pastor. The congregation is temporarily worshiping in the Y.M.C.A. and plans to purchase lots and erect a new church building. This is the third new church

on the Abilene District since the General Assembly.

District Superintendent John L. Knight recently organized a new church at Leesburg. Florida. A parsonage chapel has been erected and the Sundayschool attendance is running as high as seventy. This is the third new church on the Florida District this quadrennium.

On February 16, District Superintendent Raymond McClung organized a new church at North Beaumont, Texas. Beaumont First Church and Pastor K. S. White have helped make possible the organization of this new church. Property has been purchased consisting of a frame church building and parsonage, with the church building completely equipped for church and Sunday-school use. In a court trial the lawyer said that the mother should put her family and her home first, and not her God and the church. What do you say?

In the truest sense of the term there is no rivalry between the home and God. There is no conflict between these loyalties. A mother's service to her God demands that she be loval to her familv. Nevertheless, there are those, and this attorney may be in this group, who

feel that a mother's loyalty to her husband and home leaves no time for God and the church. This is not the case. God expects all of us to love and work for Him, and nothing else can finally take precedence over this demand.

What do people mean when they say that God is still on the throne? I can't see any sense in it. Of course God is still on the throne and always will be.

You are right. God is on the throne and will always be. But what I hear these people say is that God is still on the throne. That's a very different statement. By this statement they are just emphasizing the truth that, in spite of all the wickedness there is in the

world, God has not been dethroned. More than that, they are emphasizing the truth that in the long run God is going to win in this battle against sin. I am going to continue to sing, "God is still on the throne."

What is meant by postmillennialism? Is there anything in the Bible to support this view?

One authority sets forth the postmillennial view thus: It "holds that there will be a period of a thousand years during which Christianity will triumph over the earth. This millennial period will be the result of the gradual spread of the gospel and its conquest over all departments of human life. At the end of this period the conflict between the powers of good and evil will be renewed for a time, after which Christ will return in person. Then will take place the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. This will be followed by the final judgment and eternal awards.

"In support of the postmillennial view many passages are cited in which the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked seems to take place at the same time; in which this is represented as occurring in close connection with the second coming of Christ on the one hand and the final judgment on the other. The millennial period itself

which precedes these events is derived from the same passage in Revelation 20: 1-10. We give a few details of the interpretation. Matthew 16:27 connects the rendering to 'every man according to his deeds,' with the coming of Christ in the 'glory of his Father.' So also in Matthew 25:31-33, Christ comes and sits on the throne of his glory and judges all the nations. In John 5:28, 29 it is declared that 'the hour cometh' in which all that are in the tomb, both righteous and wicked, shall be raised for judgment. In 2 Thessalonians 1:6-10 Christ is represented as coming in 'flaming fire,' and punishing the wicked with 'eternal destruction from the face of the Lord."

These are only some of the proofs offered for this view. Soon I'll give the same author's discussion of the premillennial view. I believe there is more basis for it in the Bible.
