Trygg Leaves SGA for Cancer Treatment; Skinner Steps In By Zac Kinman

As the student body returned from Christmas break, many quickly became aware of Student Government Association President Jared Trygg announcing he will be taking a leave of absence. " I am withdrawing from school, and headed to Seattle, Washington, in order to pursue treatment for Hodgkin's Lymphoma, a cancer of the lymphatic system. The treatment should take about three months to complete, and I am hoping to return to watch my class graduate. I will re-enroll in school in the Fall of 2012" said Trygg.

Kenton Lee, assistant director of campus life, commends Trygg on his strong leadership, love for students, and his friendship during his time of service. "Jared has such a heart for the students. He was always on their side advocation on their behalf. He poured himself into his friends and the underclassmen and I believe the community on campus is better because of the character and leadership of Jared" said Lee.

While Trygg is getting treatment, Vice President Robby Skinner will assume SGA Presidential duties for the remainder of the semester because of rules set in the agreed upon SGA constitution.

Article XII, section 9 states, "upon the vacancy of the office of the President, the Executive Vice President shall assume the office of the President. The usual procedures shall be followed in the filling of the vacancy in the off of the Executive Vice President."

Even after leaving Friday, Trygg is confident about his treatment and the future of SGA. "Robby has the experience as an executive member of SGA, which will provide a foundation for a smooth transition. He will not just lead his team and the student body, but more importantly, seek to serve the student body's needs and interests" commented Trygg.

Skinner, who attended a San Diego leadership conference this past week is thankful for Trygg's calm consistency and interest in the lives of every member of SGA shown during his time in leadership. Skinner is also confident he is the right person to step in at this time. "I believe I have an adequate amount of knowledge and insight into the Code and Constitution of the Students of NNU. I have served in Senate in the legislative branch and have served on SGA in the executive branch. This diversity allows me to understand both sides of the government process and make informed decisions."

When asked about the transition process, Skinner also said he will be faced with the challenge of adapting to the new position while training the new member.

The future new member of SGA will take over Skinner's old position, Executive Vice President and had until yesterday to commit to the election process.

As for Trygg, he will still be available by email and says the ongoing support from the NNU community has and will continue to have a huge impact on his life. "Please keep me in your prayers. There is no substitute for the impact prayer can have on a person's life and on a community. I have been overwhelmed, in a good way, by the prayer and encouragement I have already received and more of the same would be a great blessing" said Trygg.

PostSecretNNU

At any university campus throughout the country there are sure to be significant differences in student and faculties' ideas, beliefs, and, yes, even secrets. As many students already know, there is often times a stigma that comes with Christian schools such as NNU, which claims that the majority of people that attend these universities are very judgmental and critical of others. NNU is a liberal arts school that prides itself on being open and loving to all people, but it seems that a number of students think otherwise.

By this point, the majority of our school has heard of and seen the newest Facebook page dedicated specifically to the NNU community. The title of the page is "PostSecretNNU" and, since it's creation, it has spread like wildfire throughout campus. The site is intended to be a place where students can anonymously create a "postcard" or comment revealing a secret they have never told anyone before. There are two rules to the page: don't include specific peoples names and respect others. The latter of the two has turned what was once a playful game into one of the most controversial things happening on campus today.

I recently got to speak with the creator of the page who, for good reason, wishes to remain anonymous. "I thought it would be a fun way for people to release some steam, or just post entertaining secrets," said PostSecret Creator, "but as the page started to grow, the way people used it started to shift. Some pretty serious secrets came out [and] debates happened." At NNU, there seems to be a divide whether students feel they can or cannot talk openly about certain topics. "I do think that there is a problem [on] campus with people being able to speak freely about their problems. There will always be someone out there who will judge us for our mistakes of even stop talking to us," said the creator of the page.

While there are many lighthearted and entertaining posts being shown, the majority of the content has turned to heavy discussions on views of homosexuality, drug use, and drinking, "I think that PostSecret could have been a great opportunity for our campus to address issues around campus, [but] along the road [it] quickly became a place for those of different beliefs to argue with one another," said sophomore Curtis Hagen.

Some students love the page and being able to say what they feel without the fear of being judged. "I think the page is a good idea," said Dan Benjamin, "it's a way for people to express how they are feeling inside when they don't feel like they could tell anyone." Others oppose the page, calling it pointless and damaging to the school reputation. "It's created more controversy and animosity... [and] is pointless," said Derek Sepe. "It should be removed." The site's creator, however, says that he/she wont erase the page, but if students discontinue posting new secrets it will eventually fade away. Over the course of it's run thus far, there have been three attempts by various students to shut down the page by changing the PostSecret email password, which disallowed students to make posts. Each time, it was regained by the creator of the site quickly and a new form of submitting had to be made.

As for what is said on the site, the PostSecret Creator says, "I really don't have control over what direction the page takes. I don't censor 'too risky' or 'too inappropriate' posts, but I will censor posts and secrets that do not comply to the rules of the page." Overall, the site creator says that they like what has happened with the page in terms of people stepping up and trying to reach out to those in need, which is definitely a positive that has come out of the controversy. Whether you love it, hate it, or simple don't understand it, it seems that PostSecretNNU is here to stay and it's up to all of us to decide which direction it will take next.



NASA Welcomes NNU Students to Microgravity University Again By Anja Kurtagic

Northwest Nazarene University received word from NASA today that its Team Super-Hydro will be able to participate in the 2012 Microgravity University program for the second consecutive year. The team will be flying on the famous "Weightless Wonder" April 12-21 to conduct a new experiment using the same superhydrophobic material used in last year's experiment.

The 2012 experiment will extend the team's research on the super-hydrophobic surfaces by focusing on its application in water purification systems aboard space craft.

The team will work to separate the water vapor from liquid water in a passive, phase-separation system. In this process, the impurities stay behind in the liquid while the vapor goes on to be cleaned, condensed and re-used.

Team leader Kevin Halle (Edmonds, Wash.) explains, "NASA's Waste Management Department wants us to test how the maximum amount of water, vapor or liquid can be retrieved from the waste "brine" produced in the space station's filtration system.

The current water purification method leaves a small amount of brine after the process. Our experiment tests a possible addon to the current system that would recover even more water from that brine without using a significant amount of additional energy."

Several new students joined four returning team members to take on a second year of Microgravity University. The team consists of Dorothy Ackerman (Great Falls, Mont.), Kevin Halle (Edmonds, Wash.), Chad Larson (Medford, Ore.), Darrell Leber (Nampa, Idaho), Keith Moilanen (Brush Prairie, Wash.), Weston Patrick (Wasilla, Alaska) and Grady Turner (Nampa, Idaho).

Dr. Dan Lawrence, chair of engineering and physics at NNU states, "I am thrilled. This is an incredible opportunity for our students and faculty, and shows the significant educational research experience all our students receive under the guidance of their professors. Our students are ambitious and deserving of this opportunity of distinction."

Microgravity University is designed to expose these promising young engineers to NASA operations, enabling them to gain research experience and to play a role in advancing America's space program.

The NNU team was accepted into Microgravity University's Systems Engineering Educational Discovery (SEED) program segment, which pairs project concepts proposed by NASA principal investigators with student teams. Other teams accepted represent the brightest young engineers and scientists in the country, from universities such as MIT, Purdue, Yale and Caltech.

While on site at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas next spring, four NNU students and one faculty will perform their experiment aboard a specially-equipped NASA aircraft nicknamed the "Weightless Wonder" or commonly referred to as the "Vomit Comet."

This jet performs a series of 30 successive parabolic rollercoaster-like flight maneuvers over the Gulf of Mexico, resulting in 25 seconds of zero gravity at the top and 25 seconds of double gravity at the bottom of each cycle,

"This is, once again, the opportunity of a lifetime for all of us, and we are thrilled to get this chance to fly again. Now it's time for the real work to begin," Halle said.
