

I respect your choice to be Catholic, having conducted a personal prayer retreat at a Catholic monastery and having worshipped in a Catholic church on occasion when I need the symbols of Christ around me. I have a great respect for this church, however, I cannot condone their horrendous treatment of women called to the ministry, so I could never join their church. The Nazarene church, flawed as it may be, has the theology that I agree with 95% and they've always ordained women even from the beginning, so I will stay with her even though there are some aspects of it that DRIVE ME CRAZY!
