The 1971 sports season closed marking the last year that the Crusaders will have to host home games using someone else's facilities. The new Physical Education complex which was erected that year was expected to integrate the athletic program on campus in one building and should prove to be a major factor in improving team morale and performance. The following is a capsule report of that season for varsity sports.

Basketball
The varsity basketball team came on strong in the last half of their season by winning 9 of the last 12 games, barely missing a seat in the NAIA playoffs and stealing the campus spotlight from wrestling once again. Orrin Hills coached the team through his 11 th winning season in 16 years at Northwest Nazarene College ending with a 14-12 season record.

Highlights included the defeat handed Pasadena in the Holiday Tournament, the hard fought battle with

Boise State which ended in a disappointing loss 63-70, and the winning of 6 games in a row on the road.

The Crusaders started well in the Nazarene Tournament in Oklahoma City by setting back Mid-America and Olivet only to be stopped in the final round by Bethany who made us settle for second place all-around. However, three individuals from Northwest Nazarene College, Al Blacklock, Denny Johnson and Raynor Rumpel, made excellent showings and were picked for the five man All-Tournament team.

## Organization Activities

This section is devoted to the organized activities on campus and those who became involved in them. The first five are set apart because of the important role they played in expressing and working out the differences of opinion between the students and administration. In this time of change for the institution these five "organizations" provided the necessary structure to avoid chaos.

The Associated Student Body began the year with the expressed intent of bridging a few gaps between students and administration. Under the administration of Duane Dale, whose calm and introspective personality pervaded the ASB, our student leaders made an admirable effort to work within the so-called system.

Operation satisfaction was established by the ASB to provide opportunities for students to become involved in the community. It had problems with some of its programs because of lack of student'support. However, those who gave their time and to the projects expressed much satisfaction from the experience.

The breakthrough in attempts to establish a structure for student evaluation of courses finally came and the student response was sufficient to make it an established program on campus.

The Student Senate spent most of its time ironing out a new ASB constitution which gave student government more responsibility in running its own affairs. The administration showed its support for the students by giving the constitution its approval.

Issues and Answers convocations, sponsored by the ASB, filled our Monday chapel times with many new and interesting ideas. The ASB also sponsored a Halloween party, the Sweet-
heart Banquet on Valentines Day and the All School Picnic at the end of the year.

The Publications Board worked with the task of solving the problems of administering student operated communications media including KCRH , Crusader and Oasis.

The Personnel Committee operated another year as the controversial disciplinary body of the school's administration.

The Personnel Council stood again as the committee which makes and interprets the policies regulating the lives of students at Northwest Nazarene College. Among the things instigated by the council was an investigation of the possibility of extending the dorm hours for women students. Also a new dress code was adopted which finally allowed girls to wear tailored pants to class and to study in the library.

The Crusader, the campus student newspaper, was the center of attention as the scene for many an in depth study of time honored institutional policies. The fearless editorials by Gayle Moore and John Luik will ring in some people's ears for a long time. The open and intellectual policy established by the editorial board along with their experiments in format and design helped win our student newspaper a place among the best small college newspapers in the nation.

The practical problems of producing and broadcasting radio programs within the limits of the FCC and the college administration gave the all student staff and announcers of KCRH invaluable experience in radio technique. Venturing into the area of studio productions, KCRH brought to its listening audience some new programs
including Spiritual Soundoff, Collegiate Outlook and Senate Talkback; all aimed at enriching and informing the campus and community.

Student Music Educator's National Conference spent the year holding monthly meetings to discuss new ideas in the field of music education.

The major project of the General Missionary Society was to send students to Puerto Rico in the summer to build a church and witness in the community.

The Collegiate Ministerial Association continued in the attempt to provide practical help, challenge, and inspiration to its members who plan on entering the field of full time Christian service.

The Shepherdess Class centered its activities around practical discussions aimed at helping its members who are either wives or soon to be wives of ministerial students.

The Associated Women Students organization sponsored most of the special events on campus including the Thanksgiving Banquet, Twirp Week, Make a Friend week, the tea for prospective students and the Graduation Tea.

Circle $K$ kept busy ushering at all the chapels, convocations and special campus events. The Annual candy sale and blood drive along with the sponsorship of a Korean orphan were among this club's activities.

Selling concessions at the basketball games helped raise money for Gamma Nu Gamma who hosted the women's extramural teams.

Phi Beta Lambda traveled as a group to many area businesses to give its members an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the practical problems in the modern business world.

The Marshal Science Club sponsored a general experiment with a laser beam conducted by Dr. Francis Sharpton: Also the club organized a field trip for its members in conjunction with the ornithology class. These activities along with the monthly meetings were aimed at enriching the experience of the club's members who are interested in the natural sciences.

As a club project, the Sociology Club sponsored a program entitled "Operation outreach" in conjunction
with the Nampa Opportunity Center.
The monthly meetings of Scriblerus were taken up with discussion of such contemporary books as Chaim Potoks' The Chosen, Achebe's Things Fall Apart, Kirkwood's Good Times/ Bad Times, Solzhenitsyn's Cancer Ward and Koestler's Darkness at Noon.

The Student National Education Association sponsored the Spring Dessert Banquet which featured Governor Cecil Andrus as speaker.

Programs for the Physical Educa-
tion Majors club incorporated speakers which put forth new ideas in physical education. The club served the school by selling tickets at the games and by distributing information to anyone who is interested in physical education.

The always active Ski Club helped its members polish their abilities and enjoy each other's company at local ski areas including Bogus Basin and Brundage Mountain. One long trip to world famous Sun Valley brought the season to a close for the club.
