

















Leadership through service is what Trevecca is about. 

Teaching Excellence Award




Under the guidance of our fearless leader,











CRUSADERS

Our focus verse this year was Isaiah 6:8: "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; Send me!" We think that this verse sums up the life of a Christian believer. When one is saved and sanctified by the love and the grace of God, the natural response to His will for us is "Send me!"


















