February luncheon speaker: Nathan Mellor. By Shirley Mears

"How to Build a Strong and Healthy Culture: The Art and Science of Consistency".

In 2009, Mellor along with Frank Smith of Cartridge World, founded Strata Leadership with the goal of helping businesses and organizations "improve the character and competence of their employees." One of Strata's divisions, Character First Education,



"exists to help teachers, administrators, and parents build future leaders with character." Another Strata branch, the Academy of Sports and Character, provides training 'for coaches and athletes to build character through sports."

Dr. Mellor spent four and half years on the staff of Oklahoma Christian University (OC) where he was involved in fund raising and church relations as well as teaching classes. When Mellor announced he was leaving OC, Alan Martin, Dean of the College of Biblical Studies, said, "His planning and visionary abilities will be sorely missed. It is my prayer that God will continue to use his talents and abilities to bless churches and communities."

Prior to joining OC, Mellor was an assistant director for strategic planning at the Pepperdine University School of Law. Prior to that, he spent five years as the pulpit minister of Hixson Church of Christ in Chattanooga, TN. He began his professional career at Harding University as

an assistant director and co-founder of Harding's Institute for Church and Family.

Dr. Mellor earned his undergraduate degree plus a master's in education from Harding University. He holds another master's and a doctorate from Pepperdine University.

Nathan and his wife Christie were married in 1997. They have two daughters.

The SNU Connection moment in our January luncheon featured men's basketball coach Adam Bohac and player Garrett Butler. Garrett, who graduated in December, began work this spring on a master's degree as he completes his basketball eligibility.

At the February luncheon, the SNU Connection moment will feature SNU women's tennis coach Charlie Hibbard and one of her players. Over the years, the SNU women's tennis program has qualified for 13 national tournaments. They were in the 2004 NAIA Final Four and in the NCCAA Final Four in both 2013 and 2014.

Hibbard, a graduate of SNU, is in her third season at the helm of the Crimson Storm tennis team. She spent 21 years coaching both the women's and the men's tennis teams at East Central University in Ada, OK. Our February guest musician will be Dr. Steve Betts.

Dr. Betts is originally from Wichita, Kansas. His music education includes a B.A. from MidAmerica Nazarene University, M.M. from Wichita State University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma.



For fifteen years he was an independent piano teacher and church musician in Wichita, KS. During this time he was also an adjunct faculty member of Wichita State University. In 1997, he became the Coordinator of Piano Pedagogy and Class Piano at LSU in Baton Rouge. From 2001–2011 Steve served at SNU as a piano professor. In 2011, Dr. Betts went to California Baptist University in Riverside, CA where he was a professor of Music and the Associate Dean of the Shelby and Ferne Collinsworth School of Music. This past July Dr. Betts returned to SNU to become the Dean of the College of Humanities.
