Spirituality

- The mystery of human spirituality
- Mircea Eliade
 - Hierophany: the manifestation of the divine
 - Nonhomogeneity: the state of the universe as a result of the mix of sacred and profane, e.g. the Incarnation
- Genesis 28:10-22 Jacob's dream at Bethel
 - A bodily need: to sleep
 - A spiritual experience: a numinous dream, hearing from the Lord, affirmation of vocation
 - A temporal marker: a pillar for coming generations
- The fragility of sacred space

Temporality

- Memorializing the past, encompassing the present, shaping the future; built environment as monument
- "People ensoul not only their houses but the settlements in which they dwell. At the same time their settlements shape their souls." – T.J. Gorringe

- The end of time
